Site Project Manager Pueblo Chemical Agent-Destruction Pilot Plant

Gregory B. Mohrman is the site project manager (SPM) for the Pueblo Chemical Agent-Destruction Pilot Plant located at the U.S. Army Pueblo Chemical Depot, Colorado. Selected for this role in December 2014, Mohrman is the lead government official responsible for management of the pilot plant's field office and oversight of the Bechtel Pueblo Team, the systems contractor for the design, construction, systemization, operation and closure of the plant. As SPM, Mohrman reports directly to the Program Executive Office, Assembled Chemical Weapons Alternatives, or PEO ACWA, headquartered at Aberdeen Proving Ground (APG) in Maryland.

Prior to his current position, Mohrman served at PEO ACWA headquarters as director of Systems Engineering and Operations. In that position he was responsible for systems engineering, acquisition risk management and quality elements of the program, in addition to providing technical support for the field offices in Colorado and Kentucky. His directorate also served as primary liaison for PEO ACWA with several groups within the Office of the Secretary of Defense that oversee the program's developmental and operational test requirements.

Before coming to PEO ACWA, Mohrman served as chief of the National Water Quality Laboratory for the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS), at the Denver Federal Center in Lakewood, Colorado. While there, he was responsible for management of all laboratory operations, research and customer service supporting USGS water quality programs nationally. In the two decades prior to that assignment, Mohrman's career included a series of technical and management positions at APG and the Rocky Mountain Arsenal in Denver, Colorado – each job bringing with it increasing levels of complexity and responsibility.

Mohrman began his federal career in 1979 at Rocky Mountain Arsenal shortly after earning his bachelor of arts degree in chemistry from the University of Northern Colorado, Greeley. More recently, in 2012, he completed his Level III certification in the Systems Planning, Research, Development and Engineering discipline with the Department of Defense Acquisition Corps.

A member of the American Chemical Society, Mohrman's awards include the U.S. Army Superior Civilian Service Medal (2000), the USGS Safety Individual Achievement Award (2001), and the Leo C. Riethmayer Award, Public Administrator of the Year from the University of Colorado (2005) in recognition of continuously demonstrating high ethical standards and exemplary administrative ability.
