





A Partnership for Safe Chemical Weapons Destruction

Pueblo Chemical Agent-Destruction Pilot Plant (PCAPP) PROJECT UPDATE

Your involvement in the chemical weapons destruction program is important to us, and we're committed to keeping you informed every step of the way. A critical part of the PCAPP project's success is coordinating effectively with representatives from the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment to ensure that the pilot plant is built in a manner that is safe for the public and the environment. Below is some information that explains how the PCAPP team is working with the state to destroy the chemical weapons stockpile in Colorado.

The PCAPP Permit

In order to construct the PCAPP, the Department of Defense obtained a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) Research, Development and Demonstration (RD&D) permit from the state health department.

A RCRA permit is a legally binding document that establishes the hazardous waste management activities that a facility can conduct and the conditions under which it can conduct them. The RD&D permit describes how the facility will be designed and constructed, defines standards and describes activities that the facility must perform to ensure protection of public health and the environment.

Modifications to the PCAPP permit have been issued in several phases. Phase I of the permit granted the PCAPP team permission to begin site civil work, such as clearing, grading, underground utility work, road paving and establishment of construction support areas. Phase II of the permit allowed the team to construct ancillary support buildings and equipment. Another permit modification request for the PCAPP project - Phase III - was submitted to the state health department for review in December 2006. Final design information and a health risk assessment were submitted in late 2007 and early 2008.

The state health department is currently reviewing this additional information. When approved, the PCAPP team will be authorized to begin key construction activities and pilot testing of the facility.

Permitting & Public Involvement

Citizen input is an important part of the permitting process, which typically includes a 45-day comment period and public meeting. After the state's review of the Phase III permit modification request, a draft permit will be developed and provided to the public for comment.

The state will:

- Issue public notice of the draft permit modification or intent to deny the modification.
- Prepare a fact sheet or statement of basis.
- Announce a 45-day public comment period.
- Hold a public hearing, if requested, with a 30-day advance notice.
- Consider and respond to all significant written and oral comments received during the 45-day comment period.
- Issue a notice of the final decision to grant or deny the draft permit.

Please keep a close eye on your mailbox and the news for dates and times for the Phase III permit modification public meetings and comment period.
